

Tri Deltas to Describe House at Convention

A report of the new house of Delta Delta Delta sorority will be made at the annual State Day convention of the sorority in San Antonio Saturday.

Construction of the new French Provincial house, at Twenty-seventh and Nueces Streets, was begun the middle of March. The house will be fire-proof; the exterior of the structure will be white brick, with grey-green asbestos shingles extending from the roof down to the top of the first story. On the south side of the house will be a terrace of colored cement.

The house, which will contain fourteen bedrooms and two sleeping porches, will accommodate thirty-two girls. The housemother's suite will be on the east side, and a large kitchen will be on the southeast side. The large entrance hall has a spacious stairway leading to the second floor.

East of the hall is the dining room, and west is the living room, with a music room, library, and recreation room to the west of it. Panoled and mirrored walls with detail work on the corners will be in the dining room, while the living room will have a fireplace with mirrors above it. Two guest rooms are also on the first floor.

On the second floor the town room is located. This room will be used as a social room and general lounge for house and town girls.

A large glass window on the south side extending from the first floor to the ceiling of the second floor will add attractiveness.

University members of the Texas Folk-Lore Society are preparing for the twenty-sixth annual "Blowout" of the group on the campus Friday and Saturday.

Dr. Charles F. Arrowood, professor of the history and philosophy of education, will speak at 8 o'clock Friday night in the Geology Building on "Principally About Preachers" at the opening session of the "Blowout."

The purpose of the organization is to cultivate and preserve the art and literature of the Texas people. Its members claim that culture cannot be imported, that it is an outgrowth of the cultivation of the inherent. The following is a sample of the folk literature which the Society says has some of the Texas flavor:

"I'll eat when I'm hungry
And drink when I'm dry.
If a tree don't fall on me,
I'll live till I die."

The public is invited to the Friday and Saturday meetings, but persons who plan to attend the Saturday night Dutch Dinner are requested to make reservations before Saturday noon.

The Society, which is thirty-one years old, has published fifteen volumes of Southwestern folklore. It is supported by its members and anyone interested in Texas folk-lore and traditions.
