Round Rock Rest Home Groundbreaking Set

American-Statesman Service — A 100-acre rest home for the aged woman from San Antonio, Mrs. Berna Liebe, will turn a physical therapy department, a kitchen and dining room, a locker room and a lounge area, conveniences at a rest home here by Sunday.

Architect is Eugene Wukach of the Lutheran Social Service. The home, first housed in an old college building, built the first two wings of its present facility in 1922. Modernization and expansion came in 1962 and 1963. Total cost of the 1962 and 1963 constructions were about \$250,000, Rev. Folwell said.

The federal government is matching \$81,750 in Hill-Burton funds, he said, while the Lutheran Social Service of Texas State Department of Health, will contribute \$142,000. A campaign for funds will be conducted to pay the debt.
