The audience, small but attentive, seemed to enjoy the subdued, simple nature Van Zandt, whose background goes back to Texas, Oklahoma Colorado.

The Mandrake Memorial, a trio, presented sharp contrast to Van Zandt, but the audience adjusted to it.


