Earth Day speaker sees hope

The belief that solutions to environmental problems are possible if all sizes of research organizations are involved in the process was expressed by a NMSU engineer in an address here Wednesday night.

Speaking before a gathering of university faculty and students at the opening session of NMSU's Earth Day observance, Dr. John Clark, professor of civil engineering, stated:

"I believe that solutions to environmental problems are on the horizon if we provide enough energies and fresh ideas. However, this will require breakthroughs and the contributions of both large and small educational institutions.

"In the past, government has had the tendency to invest only in large institutions, while small colleges could have developed a great deal of information. We need smaller universities in environmental research because they are willing to take chances on projects and stick their professional necks out."

Clark also criticized congressmen who issue undocumented statements about the environment. He

"Some members of congress are overplaying environmental issues along with others to obtain personal political benefits. They are making doomsday-type statements that carry this matter far beyond the point of public usefulness. Few technically qualified people have taken the position that present problems cannot be solved. To state otherwise is a grave risk and tends to generate despair especially among our young people."

Clark's talk was part of a two-day Earth Day program. Thursday's activities will include a panel discussion on the Corbett Center lawn from 2 to 4 p.m., in which specific solutions to pollution problems will be presented. Taking part in these discussions will be fun. experts from the university and the community.


