

Kerrville happening Folks and more folk

This Memorial Day Weekend the Texas State Arts and Crafts Fair at Kerrville will give San Antonians a chance to cele-brate the simple fact they're

While munching on Texas delicacies like barbecue and tacus, visitors can watch a blacksmith pounding away at his trade while an old time fiddler's context is being held in the background.

And after a day's worth of looking over the works of the state's leading artists and craftspeople, fair-goers can enjoy the music at the Kerrville Folk Festival.

Starting at 6 p.m. Friday, Saturday and Sunday, concerts featuring some of the nation's top progressive country music and folk performers will be presented at the Quiet Valley Ranch off Highway 16

THE ARTS AND CRAFTS fair will be held on the campus of Schreiner College and will be open Saturday. Sunday and Monday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., except Monday when it closes at 6 p.m.

The crafts fair brings together arts and crafts ranging from historic and pioneer to contemporary.

Many crafts that helped shape Texas' history will be demonstrated, such as horse sheeing and sheep shearing.

The fair will also feature performances of square dancing, bluegrass music and Raettine jazz throughout the fair's three days.

SPINNING WEAVING and musical instrument making will also be featured along a Hill Country creek. An open air shelter with tables or hay under ancient oak trees will provide places to eat or rest. The food featured at the festival is billed as a tribute to Texas palates. Dishes including German sausage, beef jerky, fried chicken, tamales and barbecue will be available at the festival.

ALL ENTERTAINMENT is free to fair ticketholders and a new concert or program starts every two hours on the fairground stage. One of the entertainment highlights will be the New Folk Concerts which feature performers who've been cho-sen from applicants to play at the fair.

The concerts are held in connection with the Kerrville Folk Festival, which has attracted several thousand

Tickets for the Friday and Sunday performances are \$5. Admission for the Saturday night show is \$6. A ticket for admission to all three per-formances is \$15 and includes free

camping on the grounds.
