"Austin City Limits," a series of progressive country music shows now being produced in Austin, Tex., will be distributed nationally by the Public Broadcasting Service, beginning Jan. 2. WNET/13 here said it will present the series each Friday at midnight.

Bosner was a TV cameraman for CBS here for 19 years before leaving New York in 1969. He has been senior producer at KLRN-TV for two years.

All songs on "Austin City Limits" will have their roots in country music, Bosner said. The various styles, he added, include country rock, country blues and ballads, rockabilly and conjunto, which is Mexican country music and also known as Tex-Mex.

Flaco Jiminez, an accordionist, will play conjunto on the episode featuring Mexican country music. Bosner said other performers on the series will include Willie Nelson, singer and comnoser; Rusty Wier, sincer, guitarist and bandleader and Townes Van Zandt, singer and comnoser who does talking country blues.

Each episode of "Austin City Limits" is taned before a studio audience of 400 to 500 persons.
