Jenning has re-signed with RCA, ending a long series of rumors that he wanted out. The Jennings had their visit cut short after five days when they had to rush back to the States when Jessi's father passed away. Waylon is performing a new song these days, "Don't You Think This Outlaw Thing Has Done Got Out of Hand?" "I don't really like the term 'outlaw,' "he says. "I always thought it was corny."
