

Fort Worden festivals feature fiddle tunes, jazz

Festivals spotlighting American fiddle tunes and jazz are scheduled this summer at Fort Worden State Park in Port Townsend, sponsored by Centrum.

Some 250 participants are expected to take part in the sixth annual Festival of American Fiddle Tunes, June 28 to July 4. The festival will include workshops, master classes, band labs and a series of public concerts.

Performers include Dewey Balfa, Cajun fiddler; Melvin Wine, Southern Appalachian fiddler; Carl MacKenzie and Doug MacPhee; the Harmony Sisters; Hank Bradley and Jody Stecher; Kenny Hall; Frank Ferrel, Bertram Levy and others.

The fourth annual Jazz Port Townsend festival will be held Aug. 3 to 7. It also will include workshops and performances. The Sonny Rollins Quintet and the Betty Carter Trio will perform Aug. 6. Bud Shank, Howard Roberts, Glenn Moore, Clark Terry, the Barney McClure Trio, Jane Lambert and the Dave Peck Quintet, and the East Side All-Star High School Jazz Band will perform Aug. 7.

CAPSULE REVIEWS

Young dancers perform

"Seattle" dance, took another giant leap forward Thursday with the first Pacific Northwest Ballet School Workshop Performance at Meany Theater." Carole Beers, Times dance critic, wrote in late editions yesterday.

"The kids, from the pre-ballet darlings who looked on-so-serious through the hard-working, musical intermediates to the airy sophisticates in the advanced classes, appeared to be having the time of their lives," Beers continued. "And why not? This was their chance to shine, to realize the goal of all that tough training: to perform on stage in a real theater in front of a live audience."

ACT stages 'Fridays'

"Fridays," a play by Andrew Johns, was given a "handsome, accomplished production" in its West Coast premiere Thursday night by A Contemporary Theater. Wayne Johnson, Times drama critic, wrote in most editions of the Times yesterday.

Johnson added: "Although it comes close to the maudlin, Johns' play is saved from being merely an exercise in sentimentality by the playwright's comic inventiveness."

Johnson praised the acting of John Gilbert, in the principal role of a "nasty, bitter old man," and called Clayton Corzatte's direction "a crisp piece of work which emphasizes the comedy and plays down the sentimentality."

Skelton plays Paramount

Red Skelton opened a four-day run at the Paramount Thursday before a "near-capacity audience (that) loved every minute of it," Patrick MacDonald, Times staff critic, wrote in most editions of the Times yesterday.

MacDonald added: "The ageless comedian... was on stage for two hours, telling jokes, doing pantomimes, taking pratfalls, playing Klem Kaddidhopper and Gertrude and Heathcliff Seagull, singing, sentimentalizing and throwing in a little flag-waving at the end."

"Mostly he was funny, but occasionally he got serious. He did his familiar bit about the Pledge of Allegiance, which ended with a plug for school prayer (a sure crowd pleaser)."

'Star Trek II' arrives

"Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan" "plays like a two-hour expansion of a particularly muddled and mediocre episode of the old TV show," John Hartl, Times movie critic, wrote in most editions of the Times yesterday.

"In fact, it's a sequel to a 1967 'Star Trek' episode, 'Space Seed,' and Ricardo Montalban cheerily re-creates his old role as the trouble-making adventurer, Khan," said Hartl. The movie is showing at the Alderwood Grand Cinemas, John Danz, Lake City and Lewis & Clark theaters.
