Hill Country wineries set to star at 2nd Kerrville Wine & Music Festival

KERRVILLE — The second annual Kerrville Wine and Music Festival is now set for Labor Day weekend, Friday through Sunday, at the outdoor theaters of the Quiet Valley Ranch, 9 miles south of Kerrville on Texas Highway 16.

Sponsored by Southwest Airlines, the three-day festival stars two dozen performers from ten states and highlights the wines of ten Texas wineries. Three six-hour 6 p.m. evening concerts, four special afternoon wine events, two daytime concerts, a Saturday morning Hill Country bicycle ride, a Sunday morning folk song service, more than 40 arts booths, plus cooking out, camping out and singing around the campfires are scheduled.

Leon Springs Cafe-home of ten years worth of music memories

Last week I ran through the exciting month of September. I'm still looking forward to all the music, including the big birthday bash (10 years) at Leon Springs this Saturday. Monte Montgomery has been added to the bill which includes Angie Meyers, Smith Brothers and other Springs fans. I'm one I know. Judd Pickard has kept this roadhouse afloat with a lot of help from his friends. (I sure) for ten years now. He showcases the best in Texas music and music moving through Texas.

The atmosphere is perfect, the food is delicious, the music significant in our heritage. The venue is outside on a rock patio unless weather gets in the way. Then he has an intimate setting inside. That Leon Springs corner has grown from the days Judd began with a small campfire outside his cafe. Cars line the streets heading for Macaroni or barbecue. But, Judd still has the best show on the corner. And the best food.

Many of my most memorable moments in music happened at the Leon Springs Cafe. If you, my readers, who also go to the place would just call me with your stories, I could create an even better story! But, you seem to be shy.

At 5 a.m. this morning when I awakened to write this column before the 8 a.m. deadline, I turned on CMT. I saw the new

Billy Joe Shaver video right before I went to sleep. I thought this morning, "I'd love to see Billy Joe again." Yep, it came right on the television. He's one of the trinitivates of Texas writers. And his new album on Zoo/Praxis label is bound to please even the hardcore fans.

His son Eddy, who plays country licks right next to blistering rock, leads the band. One of my memorable moments was the chance to hear Billy Joe and Eddy play another Texas father/son performance.

He played a showcase last fall at the Inn Pub then performed an acoustic set at the Schreiner College Coffeehouse. "He is a poet in dirty cowboy boots. He's a rough, rowdy, old-styled Texan who taps the extraordinary emotions that fill ordinary lives. He's an outstanding stylist whose voice, full of lust and tenderness,

makes common language deliver uncommon insights."

All this was said in his bio, written by Michael McCall of Nashville. I must "echo" these sentiments.

My children first heard Shaver at the Kerrville Folk Festival love his sincerity and his integrity. This man is true to his vision--and always has been.

Waylon Jennings and Bill Miller join him on the album. Shaver wrote the entire "Honky Tonk Heroes" album for Jennings on so many years ago. "Old Five and Dime" is a classic. "Old Chuck of Coal" first recorded by John Anderson, is on the new tape-Shaver's version. And he is, indeed the diamond he knew he would become. "Georgia on a Fast Train" is also re-released with the new band performing.

Obviously, I can't say enough good things about this music. And, of course, I would love the post in his soul.

The two other greats in Texas writing, Guy Clark and townies Van Zandt come to town for the Texas Heritage Music Festival Sept. 17-19. Tanya Tucker will be here Sept. 11 for the YO So Social Club Party. She and Shaver are pals. Kennedy's Labor Day weekend brings more great writing.

It's a grassroots thing in Texas. And Leon Springs Cafe is a site to remember: History Trails and down the road.
