Top Entertainment Offered By 'What's Your Bag?'

"Moments are rare," sang John Townes Vanzandt, Wednesday night at the "What's Your Bag?" folk festival. Moments of this quality are indeed rare at Lamar.

The folk festival which began Wednesday continues through tomorrow, with shows from 8 p.m. until midnight in Snack Bar I. Admission is 50 cents with an activity card.

The show is emceed by David

Hargis, who leads off with the first set of songs. His "Lemonade Soldiers" created a quiet in the Wednesday night audience worthy of a hymn. Hargis is a former co-owner of The Halfway House in Beaumont.

Somewhere between Glenn Campbell and Bob Dylan there's a singer named Guy Clark. Lamar students are fortunate to hear him. Clark, who now makes his home in Houston, looks like he split rails with Abe Lincoln, and sings traditional folk

and his own compositions as if he's been singing since Lincoln's time. His performance alone would be worth the admission charge.

Clark is followed by Beauregard. Beauregard, who has just returned from Alice's Restaurant in Chicago, has the coming on strong style of the big folk group. He is best on his own compositions, of which he sings many.

Another singer worth the admission charge on his own merits if recording artist John Townes Vanzandt. Vanzandt entertained Wednesday's audience with "Fraternity Blues" and many more of his own songs. He too is a familiar face to many students who have seen him perform at The Halfway House, or during his recent appearance on the Steve Allen Show.

Playing bass for both Hargis and Clark is Fred Destephano. Destephano almost never cracks a smile during the entire performance, but his bass guitar is excellent.

All four singing artists will be featured in a different show every evening. Each singer sings to two sets and there is a brief intermission in the middle.

This show gives Lamar students a chance to hear some top quality singers at student budget prices. Tickets are on sale in 101 SUB or may be bought at the door.

Augsburg College President Seeks 'Unity and Equality'

Minneapolis, Minn. (IP) An outline, presented in a memorandum to the Augsburg College faculty last May, declared that Dr. Oscar Anderson, president of the college, "affirmed the determination of the college to act in such areas of curriculum, admissions, and employment and sensitivity, so as to achieve the unity and equality we all seek."

Pres. Anderson presented a five-pronged program calling for:

1. The Educational Policies Committee, through its chairman, to prepare a statement regarding present efforts to provide minority history in our curriculum and recommendations to further extend the study of minority history and cultural contributions within the college curriculum.

2. The Student Personnel Office, through the dean of students, to further its efforts in cooperation with minority students, counselors and leaders

on behalf of the three-fold program to be supported by the Fund for Assistance of Minority Education.

3. The Business Office, through the vice president for business affairs, to seek minority persons to fill vacant positions on the staff whenever possible and otherwise to further our efforts to carry out the college's previous commitment to Project Equality.

4. The Teacher Education Committee, through its chairman, to prepare a statement regarding the present and future aims of the Education Department to provide adequately prepared teachers for urban schools.

5. The Student Life Committee of the Senate Academic Study, through its chairman, to submit preliminary suggestions for reshaping both the faculty and student society constitutions so as to give students actual participation in the decisions which affect the academic program of the college.

Summing up his requests, Dr. Anderson stated, "One Day in May" has served its purpose to sensitize the Augsburg community to many of the real problems and needs of our time."

Date Set For SAM Banquet

Fall banquet of the Society for the Advancement of Management has been set for Friday, Jan. 10, 1969. Dr. Frank A. Thomas, vice president of academic affairs, will be the guest speaker.

Bulletins Available For Prospective Teachers

College seniors preparing to teach and teachers applying for positions may pick up the Bulletins of Information describing registration procedures and containing registration forms for the National Teacher Examinations at Lamar on Feb. 1, 1969, from Lamar Testing and Placement Office, Joe B. Thrash, director of testing and placement, said.

Prospective teachers planning to take the tests should obtain their Bulletins of Information promptly or write directly to the National Teacher Examinations, Educational Testing Service, Box 911, Princeton, New Jersey 08540, Thrash advised.

Thrash noted that Lamar's designation as the test center for these examinations will give prospective teachers in this area an opportunity to compare their test performances with candidates throughout the country.

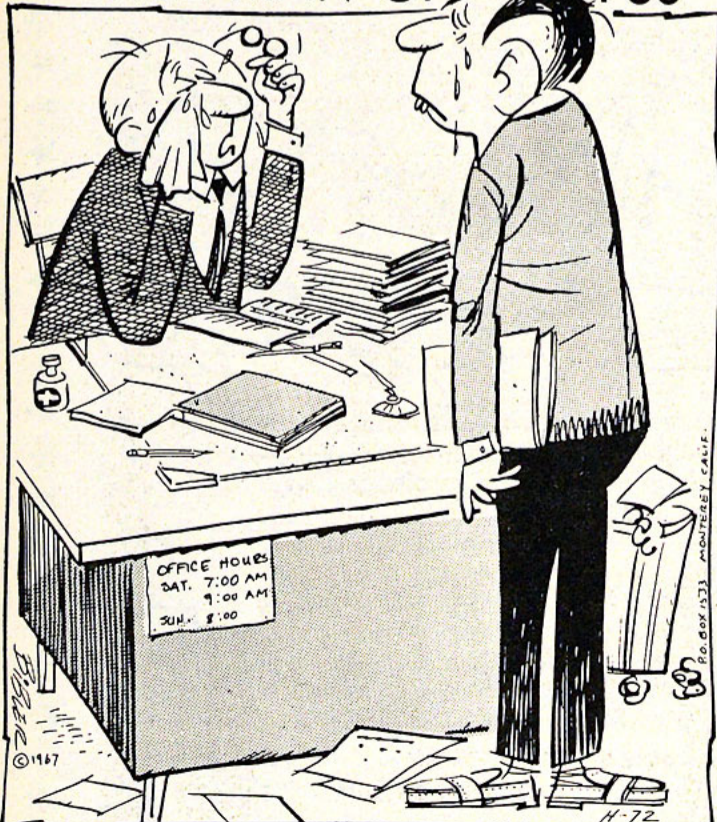
