Waylon Hits The Boards

It will be a one-man show for Waylon Jennings when he steps onstage at Durham, NC's Duke University September 10-13. With a little success behind the footlights, Ol' Waylon may be Broadway bound.

Jennings will star in a theatre presentation featuring ten songs from his upcoming "audiobiographical" album "A Man Called Hoss." Dialogue and performances to prerecorded music make up the show's dramatic first half, then Jennings and the Waylors crank out a full concert for the second half.

The play is being presented by Neil Simon producer Emanuel Azenberg and former M*A*S*H star Wayne Rogers. The producers hope to "work out the bugs" during the Durham run before it hits the larger leagues.

MCA Records has planned a major marketing campaign during the October release of the album in conjunction with the play. Jennings has previously appeared in the TV movies "Stagecoach" and "The Last Days of Frank and Jesse James," and the film "Nashville Rebel."

Charlie Spreads The Jam

The annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon has teamed up with the Charlie Daniels Volunteer Jam XIII for a livbroadcast September 6 from Nashville's outdoor Starwood Amphitheatre. Taped segments of the Jam will run throughout the telethon, which will be carried by some 200 TV stations and include feeds to Australia, Puerto Rico, and parts of Europe. In previous years the Jam has been broadcast around the world via the Voice of America.

A tentative lineup includes anchors Willie Nelson, Neil Young, John Conlee, Merle Haggard, and John Cougar Mellencamp, plus Waylon Jennings, Emmylou Harris, Johnny Rodriguez, Kris Kristofferson, Asleep At The Wheel, John Denver, Gary Morris, William Lee Golden, Michael Martin Murphey, Steve Earle, Lyle Lovett, Lynn Anderson, Rita Coolidge, Rattlesnake Annie, Karen Brooks, David Lynn Jones, John Prine, and the Bellamy Brothers.

Rockers lined up include Joe Walsh, Delbert McClinton, Steppenwolf, Lou Reed, Booker T. Jones, and the Fabulous Thunderbirds

The Nashville Network is currently in negotiations to carry most of the concert. Broadcast contracts are still pending.


