ZIGGY MARLEY DETERMINED TO DO IT RIGHT

The well-to-do Marleys are known worldwide as the royal family of reggae.

But David "Ziggy" Marley, the late Bob Marley's eldest son, says his family identifies with the "common man" and lives a low-key lifestyle.

"I am not a crazy like America," says Marley, 27, during a phone interview from Secaucus, N.J. "There's no star thing there. We live a regular life in Kingston in normal houses."

In fact, Marley describes his, and the lifestyle of the Melody Makers (brother Stephen and sisters Cedella and Sharon) as "being of the street."

"We live the same as the people who listen to us," Marley says. "Everything happening in the street's happening to us. When we sing of the people, we're singing about ourselves, too. That's what keeps our music relevant... socially and politically aware."

He contends the world's biggest problems are greed and lack of spirituality.

"All the violence and destruction of things such as the environment are caused by these things," he says. "And it's being passed on to young people. They're taught that to make it in life means you have to make lots of money. That's not right. You make it in life when you have God in your heart. To love God and one another is what's important. My hope is we can all someday respect each other and not force our ideologies on each other."

Regarding ideologies, Ziggy Marley and the Melody Makers' current album, *Free Like We Want 2 Be*, features the anthem-like song, *Free Like We Want 2 Be*, a ringing indictment of super power policy.

"It deals with the seven controlling nations of the world," Marley says. "You have the seven richest nations dictating things to poorer countries. The problem with that is when you're dictated to, you end up doing what's always beneficial to your people. Instead you do what benefits the super power."

Free Like We Want 2 Be is about the ability to exact positive change and make the world a more fair place that's free of violence.

One of his main goals is to reach and influence youngsters in his music. That's why he did "Love Power" for the soundtrack of the movie, *Murphy's Revenge Island*.

"Their minds are wide open to ideas," he says. "If they can be influenced positively, we'll have a world filled with love instead of greed."

The Melody Makers, which has been cited by the United Nations and other organizations for its many contributions to worldwide social and political awareness, appears to

be reaching young Americans with its musical messages.

Free Like We Want 2 Be is No. 11 on Billboard's reggae chart, having spawned the pop dance hit *Power to Move Ya*, and the group landed a coveted main-stage spot on Blues Traveler's hip H.O.R.D.E. tour last summer.

Marley says the group's music, much of which he writes, voices the universal messages of reggae such as equality, freedom and spirituality. Just as his father's gritty roots reggae did. But he said the Melody Makers prefer to deliver the traditional messages in a fresh style that mixes roots reggae with hip-hop, pop, jazz and soul because it
